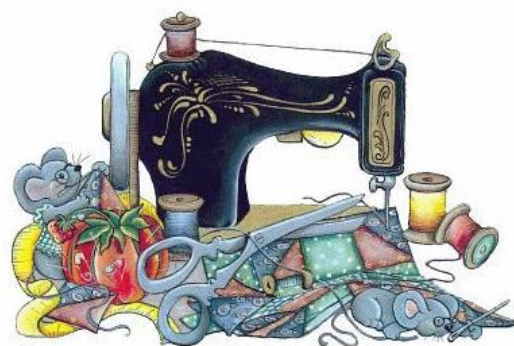

Winter/Spring Workshops

June In Person Workshops, The Pizza Girls (The Quilters Gallery) – 6/17 and 6/18

The Quilter's Gallery was a full service quilt shop run by Patti Cline and Cindy Page in Charlotte, NC for over 25 years. They closed their shop in 2006 and are doing quilt shows, guild programs and workshops. They got the nickname, "The Pizza Girls" because of their fabric packaging. Their specialty is making kits, coordinating fabrics for maximum impact for each project and packaging them to look like pizzas.

15 Degrees – Friday 6/17: Member \$55 & Non-member \$75

15 degrees is something a little different. It looks like curves, but everything is straight sewing. \$20 kit includes 15 degree ruler, 9" Stack and Whack), fabric strips for two blocks and an e-pattern. The class covers the basic technique and demo other wedge rulers – from miniature blocks to a 48" centerpiece. Appropriate for beginners.



Jack's Chain – Saturday 6/18: Member \$55 & Non-member \$75

Everyone loves this quilt. This was Cindy's pandemic quilt. Yes, you can make one too. You will need to do some prep work before class and the quilt has Y seams. Each quilter will need to make some 9-patches before class. \$29.95 person for the templates and pattern. Appropriate for more experienced quilters.

August In Person Workshops, Nina Clotfelter – 8/19 and 8/20



Nina has a passion for free motion quilting! “There is SO much freedom to do anything you wish and ability to express your creativity. Free motion quilting does NOT have to be an expensive endeavor! NO long arm is necessary! You can use your DOMESTIC sewing machine!”

Nina lives in Mobile Alabama and taught at the Houston Quilt Festival in 2021. She is an educator for WonderFil Specialty threads and loves to teach. “There is Nothing more fun and satisfying than to share what you love with others who then become successful! Traveling and teaching are two of my favorite things. My most favorite thing in life is meeting new wonderful quilters”

Beginning Free Motion Quilting – Friday 8/19: Member - \$55 & Non-Member \$75

Been afraid to try free motion quilting? Come let Nina hold your hand...you'll learn ALL the basics and more! You'll learn how much fun free motion quilting on your domestic machine can be! We REALLY do start at the very beginning! This class is for YOU! You'll come away with new found confidence and a sampler you can refer to for many different designs...that you'll create! Come on...let's start the fun!

Ruler Work on a Domestic Machine – Saturday 8/20: Member \$55 and Non-Member \$75

In this Beginner class you learn how to hold and work with RULERS on your domestic machine. You will start at the beginning with how to prepare the RULER and why this is important. By the end of class each student has successfully managed the RULER as well as learned to think with a RULER and created a block using the RULER. RULER Work is a GREAT way to enhance your Free Motion Quilting! \$50 supply fee includes: Class RULER, Drawing circle, Mechanical pencil, True Grips, Needle, Single hole needle plate trick

* **MUST** have a **Ruler Foot** for your machine.

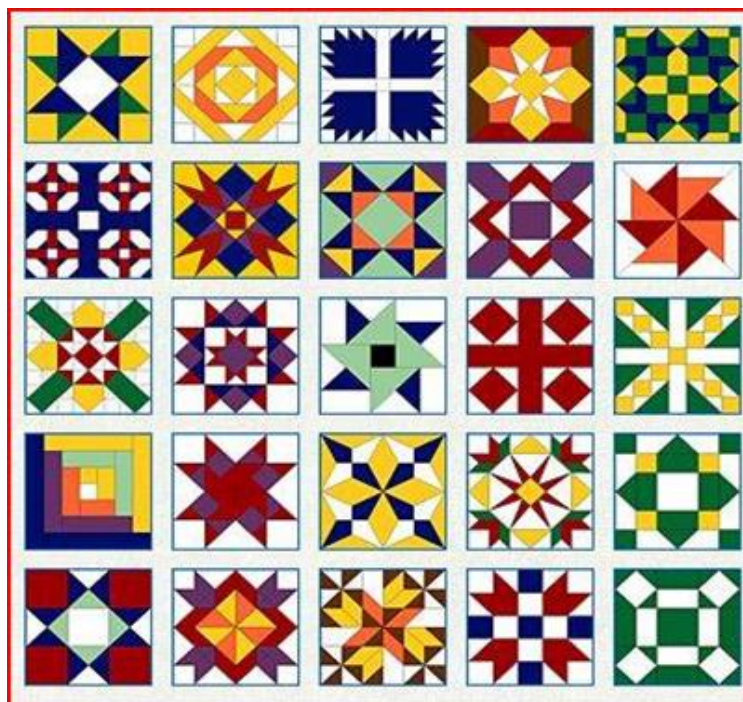

Block Party

At the May meeting we collected the May flower blocks that were distributed in April. Twenty May flower blocks were returned, and we had two winners of the blocks – Nina Brown and Meg Stoyle-Corby. We also collected ten Challenge blocks, which were won by Kim Skelding. The challenge block was a more difficult block, and no printed directions or fabric pieces were provided. Kim won the returned blocks and a special prize for a member up to the challenge! Congratulations to you all!

Our May block is sunshine. We supplied two shades of blue for the background, and participants will supply two shades of yellow for the sunshine.

Starting in July the next year's block party theme will be state blocks. At the May meeting we had an opportunity for participants to vote on their favorite blocks, in addition to North Carolina. In order, the winners were: Massachusetts, Alabama, Illinois, Ohio, South Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Rhode Island, and Mississippi. Kentucky also tied with Colorado, Rhode Island, and Mississippi, and will be offered as a challenge block some time during the year, as it is a more difficult block.

In July there will be a prize for the member who has made the most Block Party blocks for the year. Also, if you have been or are still planning to make a sampler quilt from all twelve blocks, please plan to bring it to show and tell in July. Even if you only have a quilt top done that's fine! This is something you can still work on even now, because all the patterns we've already presented are posted on the guild website, are in the monthly newsletters, and are on Facebook. There will also be a prize drawn from the members who completed sampler quilts.

May Sunshine Block

Materials Needed:

Fabric 1. Blue (provided)

- A. One 2 ½ inch x 21 inch strip
- B. One 5 ¼ inch square, cut **twice** on the diagonal

Fabric 2. Blue (provided)

- One 2 ½ inch x 21 inch strip

Fabric 3. Yellow (from your stash)

- A. One 4 ½ inch square
- B. Two 4 7/8 inch squares, cut **once** on the diagonal

Fabric 4. Yellow (from your stash)

- A. One 5 ¼ inch square, cut **twice** on the diagonal (four triangles)



Step 1: Make the sun

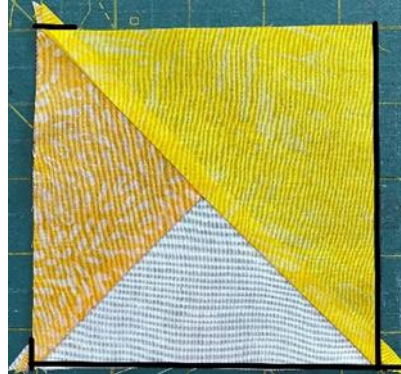
Select all of the Fabric 1, 3 and 4 triangles that were cut from the squares, as shown top right. Pair one of the 1B triangles with one of the 4A triangles, line up as shown to the right, middle. Flip the 4A triangle over on top of the 1B triangle. Stitch along the short side on the right, as shown on the right, bottom. Press seam toward the yellow. Repeat with the three other pairs of triangles.



Next, pair each of the 1B/4A triangles with one of the 3B triangles, as shown **below** left. With right sides together, stitch along the long side. Press seam toward the large triangle (3B). Trim each of the squares to 4 ½ inches, as shown below center.



To make the center row of the block, select two of these squares and square 3A. Line up and stitch together as shown below right. Press seams toward the center square.



Step 2: Make the corner squares

Select the fabric 1A and 2A strips, place right sides together. Stitch one long side together; press the seam toward the darker fabric. See photo below, left.

Next, cut the strip into eight 2 ½ inch pieces; discard the remnant. Pair two of the strips together, flipping one so that the colors alternate. Stitch one side together; press seam to one side. Repeat with the other three pairs. Trim the squares to 4 ½ inches.



May Sunshine Block

Step 3: Finish the block

Lay out the pieces as shown inner right, with the finished strip from Step 1 in the middle. Stitch together the top squares, press the seams toward the corner squares. Repeat with the bottom row.

Last, stitch the top row to the middle row, matching seams. Press toward the middle row. Stitch the bottom row to the top piece, matching seams. Press toward the middle row.

2023 Quilt Show Committee Leads and 2024 Shadow Leads Required

At our last meeting when I discussed our need for people to volunteer for quilt show committees, I said that I would put a brief description of each of our committee leads in the newsletter so that you can review the descriptions and decide if one of these committees is something you would be interested in chairing. Unfortunately, a trip to Florida got in the way and I did not get it into the newsletter in time for May.

These descriptions found on the next two pages may not be comprehensive but should give you an idea of the responsibilities. I was very encouraged after the meeting as several people came forward to offer their time and talents.

So, what do we need for our next show in 2023?

1. We are in **urgent need** of a Publicity Committee Lead(s) and for Ribbon Committee Lead(s).
2. We are also in need of shadow committee leads for all committees for 2023 that will then be Committee Lead(s) for the 2024 show. This is a great way to learn the responsibilities and assist the current Committee Lead without having any of the responsibility!!

Quilt Show Committee Chair Responsibilities

Quilt Show Co-Chairs – the quilt show co-chair tasks have been split into two groups – one co-chair is responsible for all committees requiring contract signatures (such as, fair-grounds contract, pipe and drape contract, vendor contracts and judging contracts). This co-chair is also responsible for all communication with those groups. The second co-chair is responsible for all committees that have tasks at the actual quilt show (such as quilt registration, ribbons, boutique, hanging and take down).

Vendor Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for soliciting vendors for the show, getting vendor contracts signed, tracking deposits and payments, all correspondence with vendors and providing the quilt show co-chair with information on vendor requirements for electricity, chairs, tables.

Judging Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for soliciting judges for the quilts, getting judging contracts signed, confirming accuracy/changes of quilt categories, number of awards, managing the quilt prep and quilt judging days, preparing the final list of award winners and attaching ribbons to the quilts at the quilt show.

Quilt Registration and Intake Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for confirming or changing the quilt registration sign up document, opening (posting) quilt registration and closing (removing) quilt registration on the website, scheduling quilt pick up day or days and locations, managing the location of quilts for the show, making sure the quilts are at the quilt prep day and judging day and managing the drop off at the quilt show of all quilts. Also, to provide judging committee, hanging committee and brochure committees with the final registrations.

Charity Auction Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for soliciting a charity group to partner with the Guild. This person is also responsible for providing a theme for the charity partner silent auction quilts to be donated. The charity auction chair also is responsible for preparing the silent auction paperwork and to hang the silent auction quilts at the quilt show.

Boutique Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for collecting all items donated to the guild for the quilt show boutique, pricing the items, set up and take down at the quilt show.

Publicity Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for creating and having printed flyers made for quilt shops and at raffle quilt events, prepare advertisement in the County Register, posting on WRAL Out and About calendar, Visit Raleigh website and Quiltinghub.com and other sites that may be appropriate. Also, emails in January and February to NC, SC and VA quilt guilds.

Volunteer Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for soliciting volunteers for all of the committees that require them prior to and at the quilt show. This committee is responsible for tracking the volunteers, emailing all volunteers just prior to the show reminding each volunteer of their time slots they signed up for, posting in the December/January newsletter the requirements of each volunteer slot, and providing a final alphabetical list of volunteers for the ticket sales window to check off volunteers when they receive their free ticket to the show.

Quilt Hanging Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for preparing the hanging layout based on the number of pipe and drape allotted. Based on this layout, committee will provide to the co-chair the number of pipe and drape required and other hanging items. Also responsible for determining number of volunteers required to hang the quilts based on the number of quilts submitted.

Quilt Take Down Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for the take down process, plastic bags required for all quilts submitted. This committee will work closely with the quilt registration committee and the quilt judging committee to be sure all registrants receive their judging forms and receive back all of their submitted quilts.

Ribbon Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for preparing all of the award-winning ribbons and special ribbons awarded by the judges. Sue Dressler and Katie Greenwood have great suggestions for next year to spread out the time-consuming work of creating these ribbons throughout our entire guild membership. The committee will be responsible for tracking the creating of these ribbons and the quality of the ribbons created.

On-Line Quilt Show Brochure – this committee is responsible for preparing the on-line brochure using the QR code. The brochure includes list of all entrants, list of award winners, information on judging, etc. Joni Amerson created this year's brochure which is excellent and a great template to use for future quilt shows.

One Quilter's Experience

Disclaimer: I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

Disciplining my inner 5-year-old

As my friends will tell you, my quilt journey is complicated by struggles with my inner five-year-old. And a more whiny, ill-disciplined and stubborn five-year-old you would be hard-pressed to find. My inner five-year-old “doesn’t wanna” cut 1200 1 1/2” squares out of off-white neutrals. It’s boring. She “doesn’t wanna” sit and pin-match hundreds of cross seams to make sure they hit just right. She “doesn’t wanna” wash, press, fold and properly put away all the fabrics recently purchased. She does “wanna” move on to a fun new project rather than finish one that is no longer so very new and shiny.

While we all love quilt-making, we do not universally love all aspects of quilt-making. I have friends who choose not to quilt their own quilts or who dislike binding or find the process of fabric selection overwhelming.

Over the years, I have developed certain coping mechanisms for dealing with my particular inner child — disciplining her so that she is less difficult to deal with. Anyone who has raised children, taught children or, frankly, lived in a world that contains children knows what I am talking about.

There are weird little things that give my inner child a kick, such as seeing an entire quilts-worth of fabric all cut up — like a kit. If I am making a quilt for someone in particular, I like to take a photo and send it to the future quilt-recipient with the caption: “Your quilt. Some assembly required.” Silly, I know, but it’s a bit of an incentive to get the entire thing cut.

I love custom quilting and often choose designs that create a sense of dimension — of some elements being “in front of” or “behind” others. One of the consequences of this is the need to deal with a lot of stops and starts — and the resultant hairy mess of threads that needs to be knotted and buried. My inner 5-year-old is not a fan of having to do this. What a whiner! However, I have found a huge psychological lift in waking up to a neat, non-furry quilt, ready for the next area to be quilted. So I stop all quilting by dinner time and sit down after dinner with my patience and a needle in hand. If I do this in smaller daily bites and give myself a clean slate in the morning, my inner child can cope.

For some things my inner child does/does not want to do, I engage in bargaining. Yes, you may start a new project, but you have to finish this UFO first. Yes, you can buy new fabric, but you have to make a charity quilt out of some of your current fabric. Yes, you can go on that retreat, but the sewing room needs to be tidied up before you go. I had thought I was done dealing with the psychology of a recalcitrant child when my own children grew up, but clearly not. And, alas, I have no evidence that the one I carry around inside my head will ever grow up!

What do you have to do to keep yourself motivated and moving forward, even in the face of “don’t wanna”?
