President's Challenge Pattern

A View Through My Window

2023 President's Challenge


Finished Size: 18"x30"


Pattern Notes:

All pieces listed below are unfinished.

Use a ¼" seam allowance.

Fabric: Kona Jet Black #114





Cutting Instructions:

While supplies last, the guild is providing a 5" piece of 60" wide Kona Jet Black. (These instructions are based on a 60" WOF)

From the 5" piece provided, subcut into $2 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ " strips.

Subcut 1 of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips into $2 - 26 \frac{1}{2}$ " strips (Piece B)

Subcut 1 of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips into $2 - 18 \frac{1}{2}$ " strip (Piece A) be sure to leave a strip

that will yield one piece to be 14 1/2" long

1 – 14 ½" strip

Trim the 14 ½" x 2 ½" strip to 14 ½" x 1 ½" (Piece D - for center sashing of widow)

The 2 inside sections of the window (the top and bottom of the window) will equal 14 %" W x 12 %" H (Piece C).

Assembly:

- 1. After completing Pieces C (the top and bottom of the view in/out of your window), connect/join them by sewing Piece D between them. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 2. Add Pieces B (1 to each of the right and left sides) as a Left and Right Border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 3. Add Pieces A (1 to the top and 1 to the bottom) as the top and bottom border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 4. Finish the quilt either by binding the quilt with Kona Jet Black Fabric or by facing the quilt. The quilt must also have a sleeve and label following the specifications set by the 2023 Quilt Show Rules. (**NOTE:** For display purposes, the Kona Jet Black fabric must be the final element at all outside edges of the quilt.)




Fundraising



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

North Carolina Lily Block

Materials Needed:

Fabric 1. Flowers (requires about 13 x 13 inches of fabric)**

- A One 4 ½ inch square
- B. Two 2 ½ x 8 ½ inch rectangles
- C. Eight 2 ½ inch squares

Fabric 2. Stems (PROVIDED)

- D. One 3 ½ inch square
- E. Two 2 ½ x 4 ½ inch rectangles



Step 1: Make Flying Geese

Fabric 2 CONTINUED

- F. Two curved applique pieces (precut)
- G. One rectangle for stem (precut)

Fabric 3. Background (PROVIDED)

- H. One 6 1/2 inch square
- I. One 2 ½ x 8 ½ inch rectangle
- J. One 2 ½ x 6 ½ inch rectangle
- K. Four 2 ½ x 4 ½ inch rectangles
- L. Seventeen 2 ½ inch squares





Finished size 14 ½ inches

*Fabric for flowers should be pink, red, or magenta.

Select the eight C pieces and the four K pieces. Using a marking pen or pencil, draw a diagonal line across each of the eight C pieces. Then line up four of the marked C pieces on the four K pieces as shown below left. Stitch on the drawn line and trim ¼" away from each seam. Press seam toward the color. Repeat at the other end of each K piece with the remaining C pieces, lining up as shown below center. Stitch on the drawn line and trim ¼" away from each seam. Press seam toward the color. You now have four flying geese as shown below right; set aside.



Step 2: Make upper left flower





Select pieces A and D. Mark a diagonal line on piece D and line up as shown below left. Stitch on the line and trim ¼" away from the seam. Press seam toward the green. Select two of the flying geese from Step 1, one piece L, piece I and piece J. Arrange as shown below, center. Stitch the white square to the top flying geese piece; press toward the white square. Stitch the vertical flying geese piece to the large square; press toward the flying geese piece. Stitch the top flying geese unit to the larger flying geese unit, aligning the two seams. Press toward the larger piece.

Stitch the background piece J to the right side of the flower unit; press toward the background piece.

Stitch the background piece I to the flower unit; press toward the flower unit.

Final unit should look like the photo below right.



Step 3: Make more flying geese





Select the two E pieces and four of the L pieces. Mark a diagonal line on each of the L pieces. Line up an L piece on each of the E pieces, as shown below left. Stitch on the drawn lines and trim ¼" away from each seam. Press seam toward the color. Repeat at the other end of each E piece with the remaining L pieces, lining up as shown below center. Stitch on the drawn line and trim ¾" away from each seam. Press seam toward the color. You now have two flying geese as shown below right.

North Carolina Lily Block (continued)







Step 4: Finish the two remaining flowers

Select the two B pieces and four of the L pieces. Draw diagonal lines on the four L pieces. Arrange on the ends of the B pieces, with diagonals in opposite directions. Stitch, trim off ¼ " and press toward the flower pieces. Finished pieces shown below left.

In addition to these two pieces, select the two remaining flying geese from step 1, the two from step 3, and the 8 remaining L pieces. Arrange as shown in the photo below center (make two of these). Stitch the white L pieces to each end of the flying geese. Press toward the white pieces. Next, line up the middle strip with the bottom strip; be careful to align the diagonal seams. Pin the diagonals in place first, then baste to see if they are correctly aligned to form one long diagonal piece. Rebaste if needed, then sew the two strips together. Press in the direction that makes the diagonal line look best.

Finally, stitch together the larger double strip and the top flying geese, aligning as shown below. Press the seams in the same direction as the other seams. Finished unit is shown below right.







Step 5: Finish the block

Arrange the pieces as shown top right. Seam the two top units together, and seam the bottom two units together. Press in opposite directions.

Stitch together the top and bottom units, aligning the center seams. Press to one side.

The **final step** is to applique the stems that have been provided. They can be hand or machine appliqued, raw or turned edge. With either technique, using a marking pen, draw a line from the base of the upper left flower to the lower right corner, as shown below right.

If you choose to raw edge applique, cut each piece on the pencil lines provided, then arrange the two shorter side pieces as shown below right. Be sure that the ends are less than ¼ inch from the drawn line so that they will be covered by the remaining stem. Remove the backing, press, and stitch in place using the stitch of your preference; the sample was done using a blanket stitch. Remove the backing from the straight piece, arrange it in the proper position, with the top end overlapping the flower stem. Press and stitch in place.

If you choose to do turned applique, press the raw edges under along the pencil lines, THEN remove the paper backing. Arrange the two shorter side pieces as shown below right. Be sure that the ends are less than ¼ inch from the drawn line so that they will be covered by the remaining stem. Press; hand stitch in place. Arrange the straight piece on the diagonal line, with the top end overlapping the flower stem. Press and hand stitch in place.

Trim the end of the long stem so that it is even with the corner of the block.

2022 Holiday Blocks

What is your favorite block? Do you love an Ohio star? Does a block made from flying geese get your creative juices flowing? Do you delight in beautiful appliqué? Have you always enjoyed the movement of a drunkard's path? Are you mad for the precision that paper piecing gives pointy blocks?

In the spirit of getting back to the things we love, the Holiday Block committee (aka the Remnants Bee) is asking for individuals, bees, and groups of friends to sponsor a Holiday Block.

Here is how the program works.

Sponsors commit to participate by September 15th. Sponsors select a block (or blocks) to make a quilt top and submit an application to have the block approved.

After approval, sponsors kit the instructions and the fabrics for the blocks to sell at the October and November Guild meetings.

Guild members will purchase the kits and return their finished blocks to the sponsors at the December Guild meeting.

Sponsors will draw a winner for each quilt and the winner gets all of the finished blocks as well as any unsold kits. Participants get to keep the instructions.

The best part is when the winners bring finished quilts back to show the Guild!

Q — Do the blocks have to be Holiday themed?

A — They do not. Choose any design and any colors you want. The blocks are turned in and awarded to the winner at our December Holiday Social, hence the name. That being said, Holiday designs are popular.

Q — Are the costs of making the kits covered?


A — You may submit a reimbursement form (supplied on request) for a maximum of \$50. Many groups and individuals choose to donate some or all of the fabric required to make the kits, but you are certainly not required to do so. You may also contact Anna Norris at information@capitalquilters.org if you would like to use batiks from the guild's stash.

Q — What techniques are appropriate for Holiday Blocks?

A — All techniques and skill levels are welcome. Generally, relatively simple designs with appealing colors/fabrics are popular. In the past, we have had redwork, simple piecing, paper piecing, appliqué or even some combination of the above.

- Q How many blocks per sponsored design?
- A Typically, between 16 to 25 kits. However, a kit may contain one or two blocks.
- Q How many sponsored designs will be sold?
- A We try for 10 to 12 different designs, preferably representing a wide variety of techniques and difficulty levels.
- Q If I want to sponsor a block, can I get started right away?
- A Do not spend any money for which you will want to be reimbursed until your design is approved. First you must submit an application with a color image of the block design. (A clear, but simple drawing will do.) This is to prevent duplicate (or near duplicate) blocks.

2023 Quilt Show Committee Leads and 2024 Shadow Leads Required

At our last meeting when I discussed our need for people to volunteer for quilt show committees, I said that I would put a brief description of each of our committee leads in the newsletter so that you can review the descriptions and decide if one of these committees is something you would be interested in chairing. Unfortunately, a trip to Florida got in the way and I did not get it into the newsletter in time for May.

These descriptions found on the next two pages may not be comprehensive but should give you an idea of the responsibilities. I was very encouraged after the meeting as several people came forward to offer their time and talents.

So, what do we need for our next show in 2023?

- 1. We are in *urgent need* of a Publicity Committee Lead(s) and for Ribbon Committee Lead(s).
- 2. We are also in need of shadow committee leads for all committees for 2023 that will then be Committee Lead(s) for the 2024 show. This is a great way to learn the responsibilities and assist the current Committee Lead without having any of the responsibility!!

Quilt Show Committee Chair Responsibilities

<u>Quilt Show Co-Chairs</u> – the quilt show co-chair tasks have been split into two groups – one co-chair is responsible for all committees requiring contract signatures (such as, fairgrounds contract, pipe and drape contract, vendor contracts and judging contracts). This co-chair is also responsible for all communication with those groups. The second co-chair is responsible for all committees that have tasks at the actual quilt show (such as quilt registration, ribbons, boutique, hanging and take down).

Vendor Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for soliciting vendors for the show, getting vendor contracts signed, tracking deposits and payments, all correspondence with vendors and providing the quilt show co-chair with information on vendor requirements for electricity, chairs, tables.

<u>Judging Committee Lead(s)</u> – this committee is responsible for soliciting judges for the quilts, getting judging contracts signed, confirming accuracy/changes of quilt categories, number of awards, managing the quilt prep and quilt judging days, preparing the final list of award winners and attaching ribbons to the quilts at the quilt show.

Quilt Registration and Intake Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for confirming or changing the quilt registration sign up document, opening (posting) quilt registration and closing (removing) quilt registration on the website, scheduling quilt pick up day or days and locations, managing the location of quilts for the show, making sure the quilts are at the quilt prep day and judging day and managing the drop off at the quilt show of all quilts. Also, to provide judging committee, hanging committee and brochure committees with the final registrations.

<u>Charity Auction Committee Lead(s)</u> - this committee is responsible for soliciting a charity group to partner with the Guild. This person is also responsible for providing a theme for the charity partner silent auction quilts to be donated. The charity auction chair also is responsible for preparing the silent auction paperwork and to hang the silent auction quilts at the quilt show.

<u>Boutique Committee Lead(s)</u> – this committee is responsible for collecting all items donated to the guild for the quilt show boutique, pricing the items, set up and take down at the quilt show.

<u>Publicity Committee Lead(s)</u> - this committee is responsible for creating and having printed flyers made for quilt shops and at raffle quilt events, prepare advertisement in the County Register, posting on WRAL Out and About calendar, Visit Raleigh website and Quiltinghub.com and other sites that may be appropriate. Also, emails in January and February to NC, SC and VA quilt guilds.

<u>Volunteer Committee Lead(s)</u> – this committee is responsible for soliciting volunteers for all of the committees that require them prior to and at the quilt show. This committee is responsible for tracking the volunteers, emailing all volunteers just prior to the show reminding each volunteer of their time slots they signed up for, posting in the December/January newsletter the requirements of each volunteer slot, and providing a final alphabetical list of volunteers for the ticket sales window to check off volunteers when they receive their free ticket to the show.

<u>Quilt Hanging Committee Lead(s)</u> – this committee is responsible for preparing the hanging layout based on the number of pipe and drape allotted. Based on this layout, committee will provide to the co-chair the number of pipe and drape required and other hanging items. Also responsible for determining number of volunteers required to hang the quilts based on the number of quilts submitted.

<u>Quilt Take Down Lead(s)</u> – this committee is responsible for the take down process, plastic bags required for all quilts submitted. This committee will work closely with the quilt registration committee and the quilt judging committee to be sure all registrants receive their judging forms and receive back all of their submitted quilts.

Ribbon Committee Lead(s) – this committee is responsible for preparing all of the award-winning ribbons and special ribbons awarded by the judges. Sue Dressler and Katie Greenwood have great suggestions for next year to spread out the time-consuming work of creating these ribbons throughout our entire guild membership. The committee will be responsible for tracking the creating of these ribbons and the quality of the ribbons created.

<u>On-Line Quilt Show Brochure</u> – this committee is responsible for preparing the online brochure using the QR code. The brochure includes list of all entrants, list of award winners, information on judging, etc. Joni Amerson created this year's brochure which is excellent and a great template to use for future quilt shows.

One Quilter's Experience

Disclaimer: I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

Scrappy Pieced Bindings

This is my first by-request article.

Sometimes, when you have made a lovely scrap quilt, you want to keep that scrappy vibe going all the way out to the binding. Or you have a bunch of scraps left over from making the top and you want to make use of as many of them as you can rather than putting them all away in your scrap storage. Or you just love the look of a scrappy binding. Sometimes a quilt just calls for it, you know?



Sorry that I do not have a photo that better shows this binding.

Deciding to go with a scrappy binding isn't the end of the road. You still have some decisions to make.

<u>First decision — which scraps?</u> Sometimes your scraps are all over the place in terms of color, tint/shade, or both. And you may indeed want the entire palette from your quilt top represented in your binding. However, a binding is not just the way you finish your quilt. It is the final frame — the last visual element of your quilt that completely surrounds your work of art. Don't give this decision short-shrift. Make an informed one that makes sense for your quilt and that enhances it visually. I generally go a bit dark. I like a dark binding aesthetically, but there are also practical reasons for going darker on a binding. This is, of course, the part of your quilt most likely to get dirty. If you've seen a well-loved and -used baby quilt, you know what I'm talking about. I generally prefer to stay within a certain range on my bindings, not going the full extreme from dark to light — pulling all of the medium fabrics, for example, to use. Or, if you want to emphasize a certain color on the quilt, choose all of your greens for the binding. Or, if you specifically don't want to emphasize any specific color, but want a more monotone scrappy look, go scrappy with your quilt's neutrals — grays, browns, taupes.

Okay, now you are looking at the pile of scraps you want to make into a binding. Now — how big do you want your individual scrap pieces? You can make a scrappy binding with longer lengths of just two or three fabrics and just a few joins. Or you can have joins as close as 1/4". (Let me just say that this is one station further down the line than my crazy train goes.) Your choice may in part be informed by what you have by way of scraps. If you have a bunch of $1\ 1/2$ " strips left over, as I often do, this is a chance to make use of them. Consider that you might want the scale of piecing on the binding to not be too out of whack with the scale of piecing on the quilt top.

<u>Math-phobe or math nerd?</u> If you just read the word "math" and started hyperventilating, you might want to just wing it with this next bit. Just keep adding scraps until you get to the length you want. If, instead, "math" made your ears perk up like a spaniel who just saw a squirrel, follow along.

First figure out what you need:

I most often see 2 1/2" as the suggested binding width. My own preference is for a narrower binding that ends up with the back not much bigger than the front. I make my bindings 1 7/8" when I use warm and natural batting. Loftier batts require wider bindings to wrap around the deeper loft.

[Tip — when I use a loftier batt, after having attached the binding to the quilt by machine, I stitch all the way around the quilt again within the binding seam allowance 1/8" from the edge. This "mashes down" the loft in this area, making it a bit firmer and (in my opinion) easier to hand-sew the other side of the binding.]

W = width of binding

L = length of binding (perimeter of quilt + 10)

[Note: I always make too much, but the advice I usually see is to add 10" to the perimeter of the quilt.]

WxI.

For a 104" square quilt, L = 416 + 10 = 426, I needed a diagonal-pieced binding that finishes 1.7/8" x 426"

Because I already had $1\frac{1}{2}$ " strips (which finish to 1"), that is what I used. You will need:

(W x L)/(finished width of strip)

 $(1.7/8 \times 426)/1$

(Yes, dividing by one is silly, but I figured that showing this might help if your own figures are different.)

798.75


That is approximately 800 running inches of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " wide fabric, not accounting for wastage of triangles at ends of strips. (Not having any idea with what you might be working, I will calculate based on fabric cut from the bolt.) Eight hundred inches is the equivalent of 20 selvedge-to-selvedge (40") lengths of fabric – again, rounding up. [Just like with your quilt-top itself, the scrappier your binding, the more interesting it will be.] This is just to give you a low estimate of how much fabric you need. As noted above, because of additional wastage at the ends of strips where you will not be able to get a full piece due to cutting on the diagonal, you will undoubtedly need a little bit more. So, by my rough estimate you need the equivalent of 21 selvedge-to-selvedge (40") lengths of fabric $1\frac{1}{2}$ " strips. If you use scraps or left-over partial-length $1\frac{1}{2}$ " strips, you won't actually use 40" strips, but rather the equivalent amount in scraps.

Tip: Although I rarely press seam allowances open, I do when making a scrappy pieced binding. Because of this, I reduce my stitch length to 2.0.

Piece your strip set by off-setting the top edge of your fabrics by 1" (or whatever is the finished width of your strips), as shown. Press SA open to evenly distribute bulk. Cut your 1.7/8" binding (or whatever your preferred unfinished binding width) on the 45 degree angle that follows the offset, as indicated by the parallel blue lines below.

Piece your strips RST to make one continuous strip the length of Y (quilt perimeter + 10"). Again, press seams open.





Turning the corner: Treat this diagonally-striped piece of binding the same as you would any other piece of binding. EXCEPT, when you approach a corner, you will have to stop and consider how to avoid adding the bulk of your piecing to the bulk of a corner turn. Trust me on this one —you do not want that particular headache. Here is how I deal with this. Stop about 10" from the corner, break thread and remove the quilt from under the needle. Find the diagonal binding seam that is closest to the corner, but does not in any way touch or go around the corner. Unsew this. You need to insert a piece long enough to wrap completely around the corner so that the next seam falls completely on the other side of the corner. [calculate] Once the longer piece is inserted, seams pressed open and this section pressed in half lengthwise continuous with the rest of the binding, continue to sew the binding on, turning the corner and continuing until you approach the next corner. Lather, rinse, repeat.

When you reach the end, see how your ends match up. If you end up with an awkwardly small piece, back up one seam and insert another, slightly larger piece. No one will notice that it is a bit bigger.

Yes, it's a bit of extra work at the end of your quilt-making. Most of us are eager to declare the current quilt done and move on to some shiny, new thing. But consider whether the quilt you are about to bind might not benefit from a scrappy binding.
