#### Theme: Nature

Oxford defines nature this way: the phenomena of the physical world collectively, including plants, animals, the landscape, and other features and products of the earth. Start brainstorming ideas.

#### **Quilt Rules**

**Material:** Along with our fabric, quilted wall quilts, we will continue to allow a small number of wood 'barn' quilts. Due to space limitations, the number of wood quilts will be limited, so email Laurie (quiltshowchair@capitalquiltersguild.org) if you plan to submit a wood quilt.

**Size:** Due to feedback from our guild members, we are allowing a bit more variety in the sizes of quilts. Total perimeter can be between 60 and 80 inches. This allows for some flexibility when working with a specific pattern or idea.

**Other:** Many who bid on our quilts don't quilt or even sew, and the hanging sleeve is much appreciated. A label is also a nice touch, even if you want to remain anonymous. Barn quilts are required to have a hanger in place.

**Quilt Drop Off:** Finished quilts can be dropped off to Laurie Day or Kay Harrell at the January-February Guild meetings.

**Bids:** All quilts will have a minimum bid of \$25. All will have a Buy It Now price of \$75 (or more). Bidding increases in \$5 increments.

## **Art in Quilts**

The Capital Quilter's Guild quilt show is the same weekend as the NC Museum of Art's annual Art in Bloom. If you have never been, it is a fundraiser where they have florists create arrangements inspired by a piece of art in the museum. The flower arrangement is displayed with the inspiration piece.

For the President's Challenge, members can approach their design(s) in one of two different ways:

- 1. **Quilt in Bloom** a quilt inspired by flowers/gardens, or
- 2. **Art in Quilt** a quilt inspired by a piece of artwork (a copy of the inspiration piece should be hung with the quilt).

The quilts should be 96" or smaller in perimeter and should be bound with black or gold fabric provided by the Guild. The quilt will be hung at the show and should have a sleeve on the back.

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## One Quilter's Experience

#### Darlene J. Silverman

I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

#### **Art Vs Craft**

I love that, despite all of us having our own opinions on any number quilt-related issues, there are very few true controversies here in quilt world (and no knock-down, drag-out ones, thank goodness!) Pre-wash vs don't pre-wash? Mixing batiks with other cottons vs sticking with one or the other? Press those seam allowances open or to one side? And then there is the definitional one – what is this thing we do? Is it an art or is it a craft?

My handy-dandy dictionary app actually lists them as synonyms. But, as with all synonyms, there are shades of meaning.

Art – the quality, production, expression, or realm of things that conform to accepted aesthetic principles of beauty, show imagination and skill, and have more than ordinary meaning and importance.

Craft – an art, trade, or occupation requiring special skill, especially manual skill Did that help at all? Yeah, me neither.

We have all looked at a given quilt and said to ourselves, "Wow! That is a work of art!" However, we may not universally agree on exactly which quilts rise to this level or why. I certainly find it difficult to articulate what it is that makes a quilt rise to this level for me. It isn't just that I lack the vocabulary; I lack a certain fundamental understanding. Additionally, I think it might be even harder to recognize the distinction in one's own work. By the time I finish what I consider to be a "show" quilt, I am not only deeply, ridiculously invested in it, but am also heartily sick of looking at it (at least for a while – I always fall in love with it again later!) How can one reasonably judge one's own work under those circumstances?

My daughter is an artist with a degree in fine art and she kindly acts as my (occasional) consultant on aesthetic questions. Additionally, I rely heavily on the influence and advice of my talented friends. I know where my own strengths and weaknesses lie. I understand the geometry and logic of design. I am comfortable with the math and with the mechanics of quilt construction. I

have the stubbornness required to re-do steps as often as necessary to get a desired result. I expect I will spend the rest of my life engaged in the long, slow process of honing the skills of a quilter. What I do not have is the imaginative leap that would take me to artistry. Might I get there some day? Possibly, but I rather doubt it – and I won't shed a tear if I never do. Artistry is something I can appreciate and by which I feel enriched, experiencing it in the works of others, even if it is something I will never personally achieve.

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#### One Quilter's Experience (Con't)

My own feeling is that all quilters are crafters. Some then strive for artistry. Some of those even get there and create true art. This does not change my sense of satisfaction in what I do. I am a proud and joyous crafter. My pleasure in making a well-crafted quilt is undiminished by knowing that others use the same materials to create art. I recently made some baby quilt tops to replenish my inventory. They were simple designs from precuts and scraps, but the satisfaction of a nice flat square top with well-matched seams is still there. Will the baby, or even the parents, notice? Who cares? I am pleased with what I am able to craft. And, ultimately, I do this for me! It is possible that my lack of ambition to make art is precisely what inhibits my imagination, preventing me from achieving art. Maybe I just lack the requisite drive. However, I think it more likely that some people have the eye, the heart, and the skill to take them there and that I do not. I look at my own quilts, not as potential works of art, but as visually pleasing puzzles of plane geometry — a math game made tangible and warm. So I think that my quilt-making, at least, will be forever a craft. I hope always to get better and better at it and, yes, to flex what imagination I do have in the process.
