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President's Message

Hi Capital Quilters!

Please plan to attend the February 15 meeting. We will be welcoming Catherine Redford who is visiting us from the Chicago area and will be vending at QuiltCon in Raleigh February 22-25. She is a popular fiber arts teacher and will be speaking at the meeting. The title of her talk is "Trip Around the World in Folk Art Stitches". She will be teaching two workshops - Quilting with a Walking Foot on Friday February 16 and Fabric Bowls on February 17. Catherine has appeared multiple times on Quilting Arts TV and has published two books - *Modern Machine Quilting and Butterfly Stitches*.

At the meeting, the Quilt Show Committee will be collecting quilt entries and boutique items and books to sell at the Quilt Show. Please contribute to the success of the show by volunteering at quilt preview, judging or during the show. PBS NC Weekend is planning a segment on quilting in NC and have asked to film at the show the afternoon on March 15, which will be great exposure for our guild and the art of quilting. I am so excited to see everyone's work at the show!

Thank you to the Communication Chairs, Laura Nelson and Nancy Schanz, for putting together the communication survey on behalf of the Board and to all of you who responded. We had a great response - 48% of the membership responded. We will share more details on a way forward at a future meeting. A high-level summary of what we learned is below.

- Email is preferred time sensitive information and anything needing to go to all members should go as email.
- The newsletter is a very important communication tool
- Facebook is good for building community, accessing files like the directory and reimbursement form
- Approximately 1/3 of the membership access Facebook more frequently than 1-2 times per month, but 25% of the membership never go to Facebook

President's Challenge

Quilts in Bloom or Art in Quilts

The Capital Quilter's Guild quilt show is the same weekend as the <u>NC Museum of Art's annual Art in Bloom</u>. If you have never been, it is a fundraiser where they have florists create arrangements inspired by a piece of art in the museum. The flower arrangement is displayed with the inspiration piece.

For the President's Challenge, members can approach their design(s) in one of two different ways:

- 1. Quilt in Bloom a quilt inspired by flowers/gardens, or
- 2. **Art in Quilt** a quilt inspired by a piece of artwork (a copy of the inspiration piece should be hung with the quilt).

The quilts should be 96" or smaller in perimeter and should be bound with black or gold fabric provided by the Guild. The quilt will be hung at the show and should have a sleeve on the back.

Quilt Show Charity Partner

Theme: Nature

Oxford defines nature this way: the phenomena of the physical world collectively, including plants, animals, the landscape, and other features and products of the earth. Start brainstorming ideas.

Quilt Rules

Material: Along with our fabric, quilted wall quilts, we will continue to allow a small number of wood 'barn' quilts. Due to space limitations, the number of wood quilts will be limited, so email Laurie (quiltshowchair@capitalquiltersguild.org) if you plan to submit a wood quilt.

Size: Due to feedback from our guild members, we are allowing a bit more variety in the sizes of quilts. Total perimeter can be between 60 and 80 inches. This allows for some flexibility when working with a specific pattern or idea.

Other: Many who bid on our quilts don't quilt or even sew, and the hanging sleeve is much appreciated. A label is also a nice touch, even if you want to remain anonymous. Barn quilts are required to have a hanger in place.

Quilt Drop Off: Finished quilts can be dropped off to Laurie Day or Kay Harrell at the February Guild meeting.

Bids: All quilts will have a minimum bid of \$25. All will have a Buy It Now price of \$75 (or more). Bidding increases in \$5 increments.

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One Quilter's Experience

I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

The Quilt Police

Some of you are aware that I was — long ago and in a galaxy far, far away — an attorney. I can assure you that, in my law school courses covering criminal law and procedure, there was never a reference to law enforcement personnel dedicated to ensuring that violators of quilting rules and norms be subjected to the power of the state. i.e., There are no quilt police. And in the absence of actual law enforcement personnel, who would police us? Our fellow quilters are, in my experience, understanding and tolerant — and appreciative of the effort, even when we are less than perfect in execution. After all, we are all probably a little too conscious of our own failings to be overly harsh to our fellow strivers.

Of course, this does not mean that there <u>aren't</u> any such rules and norms. And while neither jail, nor fine, nor exile from the community of quilters is a consequence of their violation, that does not mean that there are no consequences. There is a chance that you will indeed pay a price for the violation of those norms and rules, or what I prefer to call "best practices".

I am a firm believer in trying to follow best practices in my own quilts (but to be fair, it is simply in my nature to be obnoxiously persnickety). They are best practices for a reason. Following them with care makes it far less likely that you will run into the sorts of problems that make us want to pull out our hair — fabrics that stretch on the bias; inaccurate cuts; puckered seams; tension issues; seams that should, but do not, align. These annoyances (and subsequent hair-rending) are their own punishment, but are more by way of natural consequences than the imposition of external punishment by any hypothetical quilt police.

Further, while there are no quilt police, there are quilt judges. And they can indeed be . . . well, *judgy*. Indeed, we pay them good money to be so when hiring them to judge our quilt shows. We want them to answer the questions that we have about our own quilts. Is my quilt well-constructed? Did I execute this technique correctly? Did I enhance or diminish the design by the fabrics/colors I chose? Is the quilting appropriate and well done? Are my

bindings full and straight? Are my corners 90 degrees and mitered just right? How does my work stack up against the work of my fellow quilters? And, most importantly, where should I be focusing my attention in order to improve? I don't think that we are necessarily the best judges of our own work, invested as we are in them by the time we finish. I am happy to have someone less invested and more knowledgeable help answer these questions for me.

One natural consequence to being less than law-abiding when it comes to quilting best practices is that we may not be happy with a judge's answer to one or more of the above questions. In the absence of quilt police, <u>you</u> can decide just how much you care about any real or perceived flaws in your work. Or whether you even want to subject them to the critical eye of a judge. I have learned a lot from judges and I think my quilt-making has improved <u>because</u> I have submitted quilts to the judging process.

Ultimately, YOU are your own quilt police. You need to ask yourself the tough questions that may indeed lead to grabbing the seam ripper and gritting your teeth. Is it worth it? How much does it matter? Don't let anyone else answer this question for you. Weigh out the time and effort involved vs the satisfaction in the end result. After all, it is <u>your</u> time and <u>your</u> effort and <u>your</u> satisfaction. You decide.

Coming up: My Favorite Tools
